To understand how the arts and the religious do the work of bridging us into wisdom and into a faith that does justice, I want to explore one question of vital importance:





Keynote Speaker Biographies



Cecilia González-Andrieu

Latino Theologian - Author of "Bridge to Wonder: Art as a Gospel of Beauty"

Cecilia González-Andrieu grew up in Los Angeles as a political refugee from Havana, Cuba. She is a graduate of Loyola Marymount University (LMU), where she studied Film, Spanish and Theater. It was as Cecilia directed film projects increasingly focused on religious subjects that she returned to LMU to complete an M.A. in Theology.

Interested in bringing theology and the arts together to address issues of justice, she studied at the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, CA, completing her Ph.D. in 2007 in Arts and Religion and Systematic Theology. She returned to LMU to join the Department of Theological Studies where she teaches Theology & the Arts, Latino Theology, and Systematic Theology.

Her book *Bridge to Wonder: Art as a Gospel of Beauty* published by Baylor University Press provided the primary inspiration for the "Who Is My Neighbor?" Conference.

Celebrating what is beautiful in others fosters their dignity and undoes artificial boundaries.

If we work within our religious traditions, we find resources that help us see that the discovery of humility, vulnerability, and ultimately love for the other is a religiously and spiritually fruitful path.

Nicholas Wolterstorff

Philosopher, Theologian - Author of "Art in Action" - a study in Christian aesthetics

Nicholas Wolterstorff is the Noah Porter Emeritus Professor of Philosophical Theology at Yale University and Senior Fellow at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Culture at the University of Virginia. He taught at Calvin College for 30 years before leaving for Yale in 1990. A prolific writer with a wide-range of interests, he has written books on art, aesthetics, epistemology, political philosophy, philosophy of religion, metaphysics, and philosophy of education.

In 1980 he wrote *Art in Action*, a seminal exploration into Christian aesthetics. His recent books include *Justice: Rights & Wrongs -* 2010, *Justice in Love –* 2011 and *The Mighty and the Almighty: An Essay in Political Theology –* 2012. Nicholas is currently working on a new book called *Art Re-Thought*, a collection of reflections on art, artists and aesthetics.

In the community of Christians as a whole, and more particularly in the liturgy of the church, it is still possible to have an art which expresses rather than alienates itself from our deepest convictions, and which does not pander to us but rather ennobles us by its dedication ad maiorem gloriam Dei.

Paradise is forever behind us. But the City of God, full of song and image, remains to be built.

Presenter Biographies

David Bosscher Director of Art Exhibits – Second Reformed Church – Zeeland

David Bosscher helped initiate a visual arts ministry at Second Reformed Church in 2009. Since then David and his art committee have organized art exhibits that have been used to reach out and engage the broader community. Recently they hosted an exhibit of works created by artists who are incarcerated in the Michigan prison system. David uses art to articulate a mission for his church founded in faith, beauty and justice.

Themis Fotieo Lawyer, Orthodox Theologian – Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Grand Rapids Themis Fotieo is a lawyer in Grand Rapids and a life long member of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church. He speaks often to ecumenical groups sharing the history, theology and iconography of the Greek Orthodox tradition. Due to his understanding of Protestant, Catholic and Orthodox history, beliefs and ideas, Themis is able to very engagingly share the theology and aesthetics behind the rich tradition of Greek Orthodox iconography.

Larry Gerbens Art Collector, Art Evangelist and Ambassador of Art and Science for Calvin College

Larry Gerbens and his wife Mary are avid collectors of art who built 2 large collections; one inspired by the theme of the Prodigal Son, the other of the biblical serigraphs of John August Swanson. Larry donated his Prodigal Son Collection to Calvin as a traveling exhibit. He accompanies the exhibit to churches, colleges, and institutions where he speaks on how art can be a creative testament to God's love, grace and forgiveness.

lanaan Manternach Roman Catholic educator

Janaan Manternach & her husband Carl J. Pfeifer were nationally known as Catholic educators in the 1960s who wrote a children's catechetical series to replace the widely used Baltimore Catechism. After they married, they started their own business - LIFE, LOVE, JOY Associates. Their contribution to religious textbooks and many articles, and books enhancing catechist formation spans four decades. Carl died in 2007 and Janaan now lives in Dubuque, Iowa. Janaan is a very close friend of John Swanson and shares many personal & spiritual insights in her lectures & talks on John August Swanson and his art.

Elizabeth Steele Halstead Visual Arts Resource Specialist – Calvin Institute of Christian Worship






John August Swanson - Seeing the Sacred in the Ordinary

John August Swanson makes his home in Los Angeles, California. He paints in oil, watercolor, acrylic and mixed media, and is a master printmaker of limited edition serigraphs, lithographs and etchings. John's work reflects his wonderful gift of storytelling and his unique ability to "bring stories to life." He holds up the values of our community and retells our sacred stories reconnecting us with our shared cultural values. John's art explores the diversity of the human experience with an emotional simplicity and spiritual directness. His vision gently guides us to see that sacred moments in our ordinary lives reminding us that God is always there if we take the time to look, see and feel His presence.

The Art of Sister Corita Kent (1918 – 1986) - Creative Guide & Spiritual Director

Sister Corita, gained international fame for her vibrant serigraphs during the 1960s and 1970s. A Sister of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, she ran the Art Department at Immaculate Heart College until 1968 when she left the Order and moved to Boston. Corita's art reflects her spirituality, her commitment to social justice, her hope for peace, and her delight in the world that takes place all around us. On Sept. 18, 1986 Corita finally lost her battle with cancer and died at a friend's home. The spirit of Corita and her art is carried on by the Corita Art Center in Los Angeles, California. www.Corita.org









Sergio Gomez - Puertas Abiertas: Opening Doors with Art

Sergio Gomez is a Chicago based visual artist who works as a curator, gallery owner, designer, painter, professor and performance artist. Sergio states that, "The human form is the most important element in my work. It exists as an anonymous representation of the self and is depicted as a shadow, aura, ghost or energy light...The figures exist in condensed fields of color and texture that often resemble natural forms. It is unknown whether the human figures are indoors or outdoors, perceived or remembered, standing or floating, alive or dead. Presence overrides identity as I use art to explore the human and spiritual experiences throughout the cycles of our lives." Sergio's art acts like modern icons opening windows and doors into the depths of Spirit, where death never has the last word and the sacred beckons.





Steve Prince - The Second Line: Art as a Catalyst for Change

Brother Martin Erspamer is a Benedictine monk of Saint Menirad Archabbey in southern Indiana. He attended a Marianist High School and was attracted to the work of the Marianist artists, joining that community in 1971. He received an MFA from Boston University in 1986 and then began his career as a liturgical artist working in painting, illustration, ceramics, stained glass, furniture and worship space design.

Brother Martin has renovated over fifty churches, sharing his remarkable creativity and Catholic liturgical principles with worshipers across the country. His religious illustrations are well known, his paintings have been used on covers for many OCP missals and his stained glass designs have transformed many worship spaces. His art shares one principle: "that in all things God may be glorified." This motto, so familiar to the Benedictine way, drew Brother Martin to become a monk himself, moving to Saint Meinrad Archabbey in 2004, where he continues to work in the liturgical arts. www.saintmeinrad.org










Jo-Ann VanReeuwyk - Art in Education & Worship




Chris Stoffel Overvoorde - Liturgical Art for Urban Churches

Linda hopes the viewer experiences her art, "as an invitation to reflect more deeply on spiritual themes, to enter into more thoughtful examination of religious presumptions, or to embrace more nuanced understandings of either their own beliefs or the beliefs of others."


